CHANGEROOMS GRAND OPENING

The Maningrida community is celebrating a major sporting milestone with the official opening of the new Maningrida changerooms facility, a \$4.6 million project delivered by West Arnhem Regional Council.

The opening took place on Friday, 14 November, with around 300 community members and special guests in attendance, including the Hon Marion Scrymgour MP, Member for Lingiari; the Hon Jinson Charls MLA, Minister for People, Sport and Culture; and the Hon Manuel Brown MLA, Member for Arafura, alongside other representatives and community leaders.

Funded through Commonwealth the Government's Aboriginals Benefit Account and the National Indigenous Australians Agency, the 600-square-metre facility marks a significant investment the future of

participation and community wellbeing in Maningrida.

Initiated in 2019, the project has been more than six years in the making – from early planning and community consultation through to completion in 2025.

"Facilities like the Maningrida changerooms reflect what our communities deserve.."

West Arnhem Regional Council Mayor James Woods said the delivery of the facility represents a symbolic step forward for sport and opportunity in Maningrida.

"AFL isn't just a sport out here; it's a way of life. It brings us together. It teaches teamwork, discipline, pride and belonging. It connects generations and builds bridges between cultures. Most importantly, it inspires our young people," Mayor Woods said.

The project has supported local employment and ensured the facility reflects community pride and ownership.

"Facilities like the Maningrida changerooms reflect what our communities deserve. West Arnhem Regional Council remains committed to championing even greater improvements in local infrastructure," Mayor Woods said.

"I want to thank everyone who contributed to turning this vision into reality – from the builders, community consultants and the Council team to the community leaders and local residents who provided guidance along the way."

MANINGRIDA FOOTY FESTIVAL WITH SYDNEY SWANS

Swans thank partners and organisations for supporting Maningrida Footy Festival.

More than 20 organisations and partners were involved in this year's anti-smoking initiative in the Top End.

This month the Sydney Swans travelled to the Northern Territory to host the second annual Maningrida Footy Festival.

"Connect with community members, strengthen partnerships, and broaden the reach of our health and wellbeing messages."

Players and staff visited five communities in the Top End including Jabiru, Gunbalanya, Milingimbi, Ramingining and Maningrida as part of the Australian Government's Tackling Indigenous Smoking program.

This year, the primary message focuses on the impact of second-hand smoking in the community - those who don't smoke but are affected by friends and family who do. These visits allowed us to connect with community members, strengthen partnerships, and broaden the reach of our health and wellbeing messages.

Over the course of the festival, more than 120 young people participated in clinics and games.

We welcomed five men's and three women's teams to the Footy Festival with teams travelling from both Milingimbi and Ramingining.

Education sessions were delivered at six schools across a total of 22 sessions, reaching approximately 385 students.

The trip would not have been possible without more than 20 organisations and partners who helped us along

the way, and the club extends its immense gratitude for their support.

NEW HOUSES FOR MANINGRIDA

The Finocchiaro CLP Government is continuing to deliver for the bush, with tenants moving into four new houses in Maningrida.

GT Builders Pty Ltd has completed construction of two four-bedroom homes and two five-bedroom homes in the community.

The six-month project involved the demolition of the existing old dwellings and replacing them with larger homes to help address overcrowding in the community of around 3000 residents.

The contractor had a total of 24 workers on the project, including four Aboriginal workers, two of whom were from Maningrida itself.

Minister for Housing, Local Government and Community Development Steve Edgington said the new houses were an important boost for the community.

"As part of the CLP Government's year of action, certainty and security, we are delighted to deliver more housing for families living in Maningrida.

"Housing is fundamental to dealing with the root causes of crime and providing better outcomes in important areas such as health, employment and education.

"It's also pleasing to see the construction of remote housing creating direct economic opportunities for communities through the employment of local people," Mr Edgington said.

"Thanks to GT Builders and our remote housing partners whose teamwork on the ground is delivering real results for remote communities."

Construction was funded by the joint \$4 billion remote housing partnership agreement between the Australian and Northern Territory governments, which aims to halve overcrowding over its 10-year life.

The Australian and Northern Territory governments partner with the members of the Joint Steering Committee for Remote Housing Northern Territory to deliver improved outcomes for Aboriginal Territorians living in remote communities.

STAY AHEAD OF FLU SEASON WITH VACCINE

The time has come for Territorians to book their influenza vaccination as flu season arrives with more than 1,400 cases confirmed.

Flu vaccination is recommended annually as the Territory enters the Dry season in the Top End, and winter in our southern parts.

During this period, flu case numbers peak across Australia.

Minister for Health Steve Edgington is urging all Territorians over the age of six months to get the flu vaccine.

"Different viral strains of the flu occur each year and it is important to receive an annual flu vaccine to ensure the best protection against current strains," he said.

Flu is already circulating in the Territory. Since the beginning of 2025, there have been more than 1,400 cases confirmed, mostly in the Top End and East Arnhem regions.

The influenza vaccine is free for the following people:

- All children aged 6 months to 5 years
- All Aboriginal people aged 6 months and over.
- People aged 65 years and older.
- Pregnant women during any stage



of pregnancy.

 People aged 6 months and over with conditions predisposing them to complications from influenza.

This year, Territorians aged 5 years and over who are eligible for a free vaccination under the <u>National Immunisation Program</u> (NIP) can also get vaccinated from a participating pharmacy.

To book a flu vaccination, contact a GP, health clinic or pharmacy.

BE MOSQUITO-MINDED THIS WET SEASON

Top Enders are reminded to be mosquito-mindful during the peak-population period from October to January.

Salt marsh mosquitoes are aggressive biters that can transmit mosquito-borne diseases such as Ross River virus and the Barmah Forest virus disease.

This announcement comes as NT Health sounds the alarm to look out for the menagerie of other wet season monsters: murky mud, menacing stingers, mango madness, and mean extreme heat.

The Northern Territory is home to more than 100 different species of mosquitoes, of which some spread diseases to people, pets, and livestock.

Diseases transmitted by mosquitoes include Ross River virus, which can leave you feeling achy and worn out, and more serious ones like Murray Valley encephalitis and Japanese encephalitis virus, which can be life-threatening.

To minimise the chance of

being bitten by mosquitoes people should:

- Wear protective lightcoloured clothing with long sleeves, long trousers, and ankle protection with socks, in areas where mosquito bites are likely.
- Use a protective repellent containing DEET, picaridin or oil of lemon eucalyptus (PMD) and other mosquito protection devices as a supplement to protective clothing when outdoors in areas of mosquito activity.
- Avoid exposure to coastal swamps and mangrove areas.
- Use mosquito coils, lanterns and barrier sprays in outdoor areas and near the home to prevent mosquitoes from entering houses.
- Ensure infants, children and animals are adequately protected against mosquito bites.


WEST ARNHEM REGIONAL COUNCIL ADOPTS 2024-25 ANNUAL REPORT


JEANETTE BURRUNALI SHARES A STORY

Jeanette Burrunali tells a story about visiting Kamarrkawan when she was young, with some Kunwinjku language added. Drawings by Jeanette.

This is a story is about me, my grandma and aunties, when we went to *Kamarrkawan* outsation when I was ten years old in 1987 for the school holidays.

One day I travelled with my parents from Darwin, where I was going to school, to Oenpelli (Kunbarlanya). We slept at Kunbarlanya, then next day me and my auntie Leanne Guymala (Ngalwakadj Ngalbularlhdja, who I call morlah) went on a plane to Kamarrkawan outstation. It's about one or two and half hours flight. We landed at Kamarrkawan, and there was still some people out there (walakki birrimirnderri).

Then on the weekend we went camping at the river (mankabo). We rode on the tractor (mandengeyi). My brother in law (Nawamud Nadjordi, ngardduk kunkun, nawu kakkali ngamarneyime), was driving (he has since passed away).



We got there and we put out our stuff (*kunmadj*). After that, in the afternoon, we caught lots of fish (*djenj*) on the Mann River. Then we cooked and ate it

Then the next morning we went to another place to go fishing and looking for long yam (karrbarda). It was a place called Mibik on Rol clan country (kore kubolk Rol). We got there, got off the tractor and walked down to the river.

Me and my aunties (morlah

ngardduk) and my grandma (mamamh) set up the fishing line (wakkidj) and threw it in the water. My morlah were Ngalwurrbbarn, Ngalwakadi Ngalwakadi Ngaldjordi Leonie and Ngalwakadi Ngalbularlhdja Leanne. My mamamh was Mary Nabolhbol (Ngalwamud Ngaldjordi), who since passed away. She was Jimmy Kalarrivia's sister. Then we all started catching fish (ngarrimangi djenj wanjh). caught black bream

(dumbuhmani).

After that we went to look for karrbarda in a small forest by a sandy dry creek bed (kangarredubbe walakki), five minutes' walk from where we were fishing. One of my aunties found a *karrbarda* vine (*rakelngalkeng*). Then she started digging. And after that my grandma rakelngalkeng too, and started digging. Then after that, my auntie Leanne found vine (nganerakelngalkeng showed me (nganbukkang) the plant so I could see (nganang) how we can find and dig karrbarda. We all collected karrbarda,then went back to Kamarrkawan where we slept on the sand (kukayalanj) by the river.

Then two weeks later we went on another trip down the river on the tractor, with *Nawamud* driving. He dropped us all at a fishing spot - me and my *morlah*, my *mamamh* and a little girl named Emma Namarnyilk (*Ngalkangila Ngalburlalhdja*), who was Jimmy's daughter.



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She was about seven years old. Nawamud dropped us off then went back to Kamarrkawan camp.

Then we began fishing on the river and we caught lots of fish (nawern). Later in the afternoon we waited for ngardduk kunkun to come back and pick us up again. But there was a problem with the tractor, although we did not know (ngarriwakwani). We were waiting and looking out for him for a long time (kunkuyeng). Then we started walking back home along a road.

We walked for about five minutes from the river, then one of my morlah and my mamamh saw buffaloes (nganabbarru) going in the same direction as us, along the river (ngarrikebrokkarrinj). They shouted "Ngababbarru! Nganabbarru!"

I went to a tree and tried to climb up (yimankek ngadulkbidbuyinj), but my morlah Leanne ran and grabbed my arm, and we climbed up a tree together (nganedulkbidbom). Others started climbing trees too.

But Ngalkangila Emma was crying (nalkbunalkbuni) next to a tree. Her grandmather Ngalwurrkbarnj was already up in the tree and had left the little girl down on the ground (korroko bidbom kore kurrulk, barnhbarndi kaddum, kandji bibawong kore kurorre dingihdi). Me and my morlah went and got the little girl, and Leanne said to her big sister (ngalwernwarre), "Why did you leave that little girl down here? You should have put her up in the tree first!

(Njaleken bu yibawong ngahli wurdyaw kandji, ngaleng werrk yibarnnameninj kaddum!)"

After that, my mamamh Old Mary started hitting a billycan (dongidongi), trying to scare the nganabbarru away. But Leonie said "Don't do that Aunty! Otherwise they will follow and chase us! (Yun yingimewon kunekke, wardi birribekkayini manbu noise dongidongi billycan, wanjh birriborledmeninj ngandinayinj ngandingudjkadjuyinj!)" Mary was Leonie's father's sister (ngalkornkomo).

Then our elders made a plan while the nganabbarru were walking alongside the road in the bush towards the river. We walked slowly and quietly (ngarriwohngurdmeng yeledj ngarriwam), following the bushes and headed home along the side of the road, away from the river.

Then after five minutes we heard a tractor sound getting closer – it was the tractor my kunkun was driving, with his wife and kids (ngalbininjkobeng dja wurdwurd nuye). We were so happy when we saw the tractor was coming.

They stopped and picked us up and we told him, "we saw nganabbarru there behind us, alongside the road! (ngarrinang ngabarrawu kuhni yerre, bu manbolh ngarrimbolhkadjuy!)". He and his wife said back to us, "they must all be going down to the river (kare nakka kukabo kabirrihkolung)"

After that we all went back home, cooked fish and damper then we had supper (ngarrikinjeng djenj wanjh ngarringuneng kandidjawa dorrengh). Then we all had a shower and went to sleep (ngarriwam

ngarriwurlebmeng wanjh ngarrikeyonginj).

Two weeks later my Dad and Mum (Nangarridj Nadjalama dja Ngalwakadj Ngalbularlhdja, Issiah Burrunali dja Marlene Namarnyilk) came to pick me up. They had travelled by car. We all slept one night at Kamarrkawan then left for Kunbarlanya the next day. We slept there one night and went back to Darwin the next morning.


I had a great time out there for the school holidays.at Kamarrkawan with my Auntie Leanne and my other *morlah* and family.

At that time I was schooling at Darwin, at Tiwi primary school. I was there for six years, and before that I was at Millner School for four years.

Afterthose years I got older (ngakimukminj) and went to Nightcliff High School with my sisters Rosemary Nabulwad (Ngalbangardi Ngalmadjawarr) and Gwen Nayilibidj (Ngalbangardi Ngaldulmankarr) and our brother, who has since passed away (Nabangardi Nadulmankarr nawu bolkyakminj). Michelle Bengarr (Ngalkangila *Ngalmarrirn*) with us too.

(karridurndeng, cyclone nakimuk kamhre!)" my morlah Old Molly Navilibidj (Ngalwakadj Ngaldjalama) told us. She was worried (keleminj). We had to stop at Kunbarlanja for a while until the cyclone went away.
